Language Learners


A new program was recently launched to promote digital literacy to highly-motivated ESL learners, and both KLC & Samaritas are impressed with the learners' participation and progress. While the KLC does offer Digital Skills at several Community Literacy Centers, those are typically geared toward English-speaking adults. Charles Miller, KLC's ESL Navigator, worked closely with the team at Samaritas to adapt the curriculum, step by step, to fit the language abilities of these new learners.

One initial challenge was that the variety of different languages spoken - as many as six - between the learners meant that a simple translation would not work for most tasks during a lesson. We created a curriculum that employs modeling, immersion, and exploration. The class is taught in English but we use beginner-level words and phrases. The lesson starts by reviewing and learning new vocabulary such as "mouse" or "keyboard." We then practice new skills, like typing and searching, working with each student to show how to use their fingers to manipulate the keys.

In just three lessons, the learners could type several words per minute and search terms on a website. We also taught how to navigate websites, find photos or videos, and use translation sites.

In addition to Digital Skills, many learners also enrolled in the Summer ESL program to improve their general English skills. They are enthusiastic about embracing their new community and some have even begun to apply for their first jobs in the U.S. We look forward to continuing to support them on their learning journeys and our partners in their advocacy efforts.




Kalamazoo SORABBLE FEST PLAY WITH PURPOSE
